CSE Action Plan Updated

The SSCB has updated its [CSE Action Plan](#) and published a [summary](#) of progress to date. The actions contained in the new plan have been agreed by all partners and reflect the feedback we have had from a wide range of stakeholders, including children and their families, inspectorates and front-line staff from across the children's workforce. The partnership has been able to build on the successful delivery of last year's action plan.

The revised plan allows the partnership to focus collective efforts on those areas in need of greatest attention, including:

- ❖ The need to develop effective responses for vulnerable groups – including children in care, children with additional learning needs/disabilities and unaccompanied asylum seeking children
- ❖ Ensuring parents of children at risk of or experiencing CSE are consistently offered and provided with high-quality support
- ❖ Developing a better understanding of perpetrators and CSE hotspots in Surrey; and
- ❖ Developing better and more sophisticated ways of gathering the views of children and young people to inform operational and strategic decisions

Signs Of Safety - Strengthening multi-agency teamwork through Signs of Safety training

The **Signs of Safety** practice model is being embedded into Surrey County Council's children services, schools and learning, and family services. It is a strengths-based model that focuses on finding solutions by working inclusively with children and families to keep children safe and develop their wellbeing.

The council's training programme to establish Signs of Safety covers the principles, processes and tools that will guide direct work with children, young people and families. Its introduction is aimed at strengthening partnership working with families to not only keep a child safe, but to positively support their learning and early help interventions.

By adopting Signs of Safety, collaboration and consistent way of working across teams will become easier and help to meet the aims of the Safer Surrey approach, introduced in early 2016. Safer Surrey has driven a cultural shift towards a whole-system way of working and focus on strengths-based practice to improve outcomes for children.

The drive to embed Signs of Safety and support learning from its use will be evident over the next couple of years. Positive responses from partners and colleagues who have attended child protection conferences and multi-agency planning meetings recently, are encouraging.

The MASH responds to initial enquiries about children, young people and adults. The MASH is based at Guildford Police Station and combines Children's Service social workers, Adult's Service social workers, and health and police staff. White Ribbon Campaign

The White Ribbon Campaign aims to educate and raise awareness of violence against women, and to engage men in these issues. Wearing a White Ribbon is a personal Pledge to never commit, condone or remain silent about violence against women. Each year, on 25 November, the White Ribbon Campaign urges as many people as possible to take their pledge and sign up to wear a white ribbon. The 25 November is the chosen day because this coincides with the 'International day against violence against women and girls.' This year the White Ribbon campaign will also be raising awareness on some of the cuts to services and how these can impact on disclosures and keeping victims of domestic abuse safe. Surrey Fire & Rescue Service - Firewise Scheme

Surrey Fire & Rescue Service offers a free educational scheme, called Firewise, to address, with information and education, children's interest and curiosity about fire.

Within the scheme, Firewise Advisors work with children, with their parents or carers present, to make them aware of the dangers of fire and the potential consequences of their actions, in order to reduce the likelihood of children playing with fire in the future and therefore safeguard them and their families. Early intervention is vital in changing behaviour.

Takeover Challenge 2017 - 24th November 2017

The Takeover Challenge was originally launched in 2007, by the Children's Commissioner, as an imaginative way to encourage organisations across the country to open their doors to children and young people to take over the decision making. It aims to put children and young people at the heart of the decision making, and to really listen to their views.

Last year, colleagues from the children, schools & families, commissioning & prevention team and democratic services worked together to organise Takeover day, and welcomed 50 young people aged 11-25 into County Hall to take part. We held many exciting workshops and activities. For example, a care leaver spoke about how we face different kind of challenges throughout our life, and how we can overcome adversity. Seb, from the Youth Collective, talked about the importance of young people taking opportunities to get their voices heard. HR ran a workshop on Surrey's apprenticeship offer, and asked for feedback, specifically on how they can attract more young people to start apprenticeships with us. The office of the Police and Crime Commissioner held a workshop to discover how they could improve young people's relationships with the police.

The feedback from last year was very positive, and young people said that they enjoyed being able to give their opinion, learning about apprenticeships and other things they wouldn't always hear about at school. We were awarded a silver commendation for Takeover Day 2016 from the Children's Commissioner's Up for the Challenge scheme.

This year, we are hosting our Takeover Day specifically for looked after children and care leavers. We will be introducing them to the real life decision makers, and putting the power into their hands for the day. They will get the opportunity to express what they want to see stopped, started, or changed about the care system, and they will be able to hold professionals accountable for these changes. They will also learn more about how decisions are made within Surrey County Council, and the different processes they go through.

We want to ensure that we are putting young people and children at the centre of our work, and that we are acting on what they tell us. We believe the Takeover Challenge is a great opportunity to really engage with our children and young people, and allow them to feel empowered and a part of the decision making process.

Takeover Day 2017 will be hosted at County Hall on Friday 24th November 2017, and we hope to open our doors to a large number of looked after children and young people across the county.

Child Protection – Information Sharing Project (CP-IS)



The Child Protection – Information Sharing (CP-IS) project is an NHS England sponsored work programme dedicated to developing an information sharing solution that will deliver a higher level of protection to children who visit NHS unscheduled care settings. It proposes to do so by connecting local authorities' child protection social care IT systems with those used by staff in NHS unscheduled care settings therefore when implemented, it will help to deliver the Department of Health policy "Making sure health and social care services work together".

CP-IS will provide health professionals with prompt and easy access to key social care information. This project will link the IT systems of NHS unscheduled care to those used by social care child protection teams, so that information can be shared about three specific categories. These are child or young person;

- with a child protection plan
- who are looked after
- pregnant woman whose unborn child will be subject to a child protection plan.

Surrey are working towards the implementation of CP-IS and Guildford and Waverley CCG and SCC are working with NHS Digital to achieve this. It is anticipated that that this will be operational by the end of September 2017.

Operation Encompass



All schools in Surrey have been invited to take part in Operation Encompass, which is being jointly run by Surrey Police and Surrey County Council's Children's Schools and Families, with the support of Surrey Domestic Abuse Services. The project, launched at the end of June, aims to safeguard and support children and young people who are involved in or affected by domestic abuse, or who are reported missing, by swiftly sharing information between partner agencies.

As part of Operation Encompass, every school day morning Surrey Police will search their systems for incidents during the previous 24 hours where a child under 18 was linked to, involved in or a witness to domestic abuse, or where a child was reported missing. On Monday mornings the search will include incidents over the weekend. This information and a short summary of the incident is then shared with the Education Safeguarding Team who, in turn, inform the child's school or college by 9.30am each day so that timely support can be offered. In this way, the right professionals will receive the right information at the right time to take the most appropriate action. Carbon Monoxide awareness



Carbon Monoxide (CO) awareness is just important in the winter as it is in the summer. Poorly maintained appliances and boilers can cause carbon monoxide poisoning, which can be fatal.

Carbon Monoxide poisoning is also a significant risk to health after a flood, and Public Health England warns to never use petrol or diesel generators indoors when pumping out water or drying homes. Using temporary heaters or generators to pump water out in enclosed spaces increases the risk of [carbon monoxide poisoning](#). Petrol- or diesel-powered generators, dehumidifiers and pressure washers should never be used indoors without adequate ventilation as their exhaust gases can build up and kill.

The early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can mimic many common ailments and may easily be confused with food poisoning, viral infections, flu or simple tiredness. Symptoms to look out for include;

- headaches or dizziness
- breathlessness
- nausea
- loss of consciousness
- tiredness
- pains in the chest or stomach
- erratic behaviour
- visual problems

[Surrey Police](#) has issued a safety warning to children in the county using Snapchat. The photo-inspired instant messaging app has released a potentially dangerous new feature that shows everyone on your contact list exactly where you are at any point. Once you update the app, your location will be instantly revealed.



Surrey Police said: "We are encouraging users to change their settings to 'ghost mode' to avoid sharing this information. "If your children or other young people you know use Snapchat, encourage them to change their settings too!"
